Missional Week of Prayer 17th to 24th November 2013

All the world's a stage,

We are invited to participate in a structured daily reading plan provided by Colonel David Guy.

There will be mid-day prayers in the Hall Monday to Friday and opportunity for working people to come together in the

evening to share prayer. Colonel Ron Johnson had a vision of groups of people of similar age praying for their age group and their needs; some may want to respond to this. Others may want to do prayer walking from the Hall or in their local community. However God prompts us to use this week, and whatever initiatives he inspires, let us feel confident enough to respond to him and invite others to share with us.



The Light will have its own Missional focus on prayer with the quiet area offered to the public to engage with prayer or to invite prayer on their behalf.

Weekday meetings will have a prayer focus and literature/books offered, particularly those not involved in the Corps' worship life.

Sectional practices will allow for the theme of the week and welcome those who wish to observe and enjoy the music which for some of the time will be of a devotional nature.
